WHAT IS DOWNTOWN?

When we refer to "Downtown" as our mission area, we are referring to the geographic boundaries of the "Hopewell Downtown Historic District" as recognized by the Virginia Department of Historic Resources and the National Park Service. We also mean "Downtown" as in the people and the places - past, present and future - that make it special. HDP is the only organization solely dedicated to representing and advocating for this district and its role as a social, cultural and economic hub for our city.

WHO WE ARE

We are locals supporting local; a grassroots 501(C)3 nonprofit organization with passionate leadership and volunteers.

Our origin story begins in 2007 when the level of deterioration of the Downtown started to threaten the integrity of its historical structures and its social, cultural and economic relevance to Hopewell and the surrounding areas. In 2011 after several years of organizing, we hired our first Executive Director and earned Accreditation with the National Main Street Center.

OUR MISSION

"To build a healthy, vibrant, and more prosperous central downtown district <u>with</u> the Hopewell community."

By organizing our community from within and improving quality of life at the core, we are initiating a ripple effect throughout the City and the region.

WHAT WE BELIEVE

Like the National Main Street Center, we believe that "everyone deserves access to a vibrant neighborhood – a place that has a thriving local economy, is rich in character, and features inviting public spaces that make residents and visitors feel that they belong."

Our neighborhoods and commercial districts are essential to our collective identity and shared experiences as humans and our environments directly impact our well-being.

A fully revitalized and walkable downtown with accessible, high quality public spaces, great restaurants and entertainment, historic and modern attractions, an active and connected waterfront, and shops and storefronts that represent our community equitably in style <u>and</u> ownership.

ABOUT PROJECT



For hundreds of years, Hopewell - a City of 24,000 - has served the nation as an epicenter for manufacturing and transport. However, the corridor that connects industry to our Historic Downtown stands neglected.

In the City of Hopewell's most recent Comprehensive Plan, the vision statement for Downtown Hopewell includes "an appealing gateway design that creates a welcoming environment."

With funding from Norfolk Southern and support from locality, we are seeking proposals from a) metal workers b) mural artists or c) a metal worker and a mural artist team to transform the Levin D James underpass, its supporting columns, and retaining walls - into a welcoming gateway between industry and our Historic Downtown. It is important that the community be engaged in the design process.

INDUSTRIAL HISTORY...

The City Point Railroad, built in 1838 between City Point (Hopewell) and Petersburg, lies above the Levin D. James Underpass and is considered the oldest portion of the Norfolk and Western Railway, now a part of Norfolk Southern. Hopewell was developed by DuPont Company in 1914 as Hopewell Farm. DuPont first built a dynamite factory, then switched to the manufacture of guncotton during World War I. Hopewell became known as the "Wonder City" when it recovered from nearly burning to the ground in 1915 and then grew from a population of 400 to more than 20,000 in a few short months.

A large number of kit homes were hauled in and erected in neighborhoods laid out by DuPont as "A Village" for management and "B Village" for workers. Hopewell also became known as an internationally diverse city. Immigrants from the Caucasus and Bohemia regions (now the western lands of the Czech Republic), as well as Italy, and Greece worked in the factories and opened small businesses.

After DuPont abandoned its sites following World War I, Hopewell experienced a ghost town period until 1923 when Tubize Corporation took over the site. The Tubize plant was later acquired by Firestone Tire and Rubber Company and was a major employer in Hopewell for decades. Numerous other sites were established over the years Hopewell continues to be a chemical engineering and manufacturing hub and critical to the national supply chain.

In the 1970's and 80's, chemical dumping, urban sprawl led to disinvestment and vacancy in our downtown; a situation not unique to our City. Hopewell has encouraged re-development along its waterfront areas at the confluence of the James and Appomattox Rivers, and the City Point Historic District. Our organization has spearheaded the revitalization of the Hopewell Downtown Historic District for the past 15 years. Since 2011, we've championed Downtown from a 50% vacancy rate to an emerging commercial corridor.

PROJECT GOALS...

This project will result in a welcoming gateway between Hopewell's industrial corridor and Historic Downtown. Animating this underpass space will balance and tie together existing placemaking and beautification efforts in the area.

Direct outcomes from this project could include:

- a community-informed visual narrative about the historic railway, industry, or Downtown
- art as "wayfinding gateway" to indicate that one is entering/leaving a special place
- bright, vibrant colors added to the color pallette of Downtown
- community engagement with the arts and history
- increased feeling of "welcomeness"
- increased feelings of community pride
- increased foot-traffic
- increased sales and/or new business attraction
- crime and blight deterrent
- positive local, regional, and state media coverage

Highly Visible:

The Annual Average Daily Traffic (AADT) and Annual Average Weekday Traffic (AAWDT) demonstrate the impact that this site will have on perceptions and first impressions of Downtown Hopewell, the City, and Norfolk Southern. Between Main Street and Winston Churchill Dr., 10,000 cars drive through each day which averages to 300,000 cars on average each month. With approximately 1.5 people per vehicle, that amounts to 15,000 impressions on average per day and 450,000 impressions per month.









PROJECT BUDGET



Total Artist Stipend Available: \$10,000

Total Monies Available for Artist to Source Supplies and Materials: \$11,000

Total Travel & Lodging Stipend: \$1200
